Fuck Cancer is a 501(c)3 nonprofit in the United States and a registered Canadian charity dedicated to prevention, early detection, and providing emotional support and guidance to those affected by cancer.

This year presented new and unique challenges, but with your support we were able to continue our digital and on-the-ground programs that seek to help people prevent & detect cancer early and help patients & caregivers navigate the cancer process.

The COVID-19 pandemic radically impacted our work, from requiring us to scale-back our clinic work providing routine cancer screenings, to shifting from in-person community-building events to digital only, to opening our eyes to new programs addressing gaps in the cancer space.

This new thinking helped us respond to the ongoing racial justice reckoning, where we went all in on being an anti-racist organization and recommitted ourselves to addressing inequities in cancer outcomes.

Whether you're new here or a longtime Fuck Cancer community member, we want to say thank you for supporting and growing with us. We can't wait to see what we can accomplish next year and beyond.

2020 Impact Summary

Here's an overview of what we accomplished this year:





PREVENTION & EARLY DETECTION

Did you know that most cancers are curable if caught in Stage 1? How about that up to 50% of cancers can be prevented?

Billions of dollars have been spent on the cure for cancer while funding for prevention and early detection has largely been neglected. We aim to fill in where other organizations have left off and give people the tools and resources they need to put an end to late stage cancer diagnoses.

<u>Community Health Clinics</u>

COVID-19 has disrupted early cancer detection. In the U.S., the pandemic has led to approximately 65% fewer cancer screenings than normal, which will lead to a predicted 10,000 excess deaths in the next decade from breast and colon cancer alone.

We work with community health clinics in New York and Los Angeles to increase screenings for early cancer detection and promote vaccinations to prevent HPV-associated cancers. These community clinics traditionally treat underserved populations, including BIPOC communities, the uninsured, and the unhoused. We fund screenings for cancers that are highly curable when caught early.

While the clinics we work with tried diligently to provide screenings during COVID-19, their operations were inevitably impacted.



- Institute for Family Health Center of Harlem, New York | Serves medically underserved communities



<u>**Teen Peer Health Educators</u></u></u>**

The HPV vaccine is simple, safe, and effective at preventing six different types of cancer. Unfortunately, more than 50% of adolescents in the U.S. have not completed the HPV vaccine. Vaccination rates are low because many people simply don't know that such a powerful cancer prevention tool exists.



Teens often rely on their peers for information, including health information and advice. We work with high school students across Los Angeles County to train them to be peer health educators on HPV-associated cancers and the HPV vaccine, in turn improving HPV vaccination rates in Los Angeles. We accomplish this work in partnership with The Los Angeles Trust for Children's Health.

<u>Food Security</u>

On a normal day, those with cancer are immunocompromised, meaning they need to avoid public gatherings and places they might catch germs, infections, or diseases, such as grocery stores and restaurants. With COVID-19 in the mix, this is more important than ever. Unfortunately, this means that cancer patients have higher than average levels of food insecurity, which directly impacts their survival and quality of life. People who are uninsured, young, Hispanic, or Black have higher rates of food insecurity and 56% of low-income patients receiving cancer care experience food insecurity.



To address food insecurity among cancer patients, we launched a Food Security program this year. We teamed up with God's Love We Deliver in NYC and Project Angel Food in LA to deliver healthy and medically appropriate meals and care packages to homebound cancer patients.









A cancer diagnosis can leave everyone feeling overwhelmed. Patients and caregivers often don't know where to start when preparing a list of things they need, and loved ones might not know how to help in the first place.



That's why we partnered with Standwith!

Standwith is a care management app that takes the guesswork out of getting and giving help. Now, patients and caregivers can manage the constant stream of "How can I help?" and "What do you need?" texts from well-intentioned loved ones and make sure friends and family members show support in ways that are actually useful.



After undergoing a mastectomy, there are typically a few options available. You can choose to stay flat-chested, get implants, or have nipple reconstruction. There's no wrong answer, and we believe all post-cancer bodies are beautiful, but we wanted to add another option to the mix. What if you could turn something painful into a work of art?







Matched 106 survivors and artists since program inception

Our Personal Ink (P.Ink) program matches breast cancer survivors with skilled tattoo artists specially trained to handle scar work and do beautiful full-chest tattoos after a mastectomy. This year, due to COVID-19, we were unable to host any P.Ink Days or support new tattoos, but we compiled testimonials and photos from past recipients to show off how badass and beautiful these survivors are.






Digital Education & Events

We work hard to build community and increase cancer knowledge to help individuals take control of their own health. This year, we focused on our online community building and education initiatives to spread the word about cancer prevention and early detection, and offer some support along the way.



<u>Digital Education</u>

This year, we increased our digital education offerings to extend cancer information to people in their homes to help them take control of their health. On our website and social media channels, and through partnerships with other organizations, we published information on a variety of topics related to cancer, particularly highlighting prevention, early detection, and health disparities.



Cancer Disparities

Anyone can get cancer. However, our age, race, gender, and wealth impact our experiences with cancer, including how we protect ourselves, how early we catch it, and how effective treatment is at beating our cancer.

After noticing a gap in the cancer space, we launched a comprehensive resource on our website to address health disparities in cancer. It's critical that we all do more to achieve full equity across the cancer space and we vow to continue prioritizing this work.



We held our first-ever streaming event to bring our community together and raise awareness. Over the 12-hour marathon stream, we were joined by an eclectic mix of 20 passionate streamers, music artists, and influencers including Nadeshot, Harry Mack, and Maggie Lindemann.





To provide some socially distanced physical activity for our community, we started hosting online community workouts. So far, we've streamed three professionally hosted workouts that can be done at home and are designed for anyone to be able to do.







We hosted a hangout bringing together Megan Thee Stallion and some of her biggest fans currently dealing with cancer during COVID-19 for an intimate, virtual hang.
